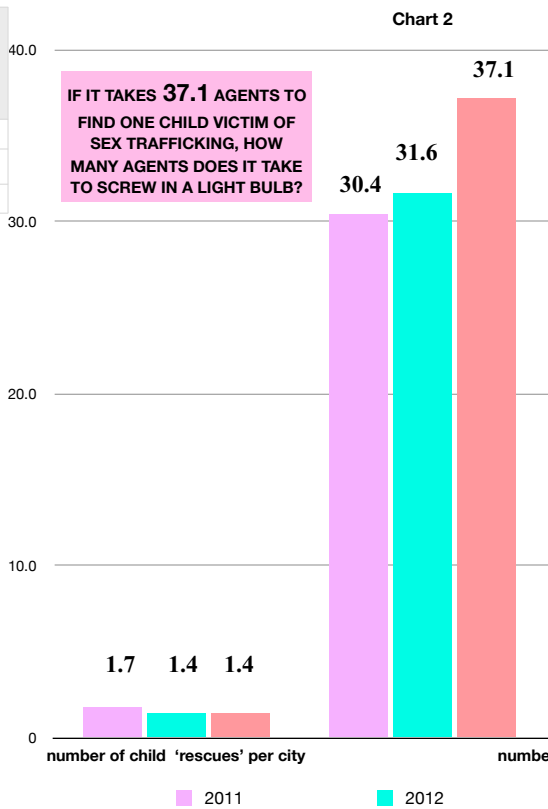

More info on how 'successful' these raids were:
 In the three year period from 2011 to 2013, over a total of 9 days (3 days each year), it took **8,500** agents to arrest and 'rescue' a total of **602** people:
253 children
349 pimps
 in **173** cities
(even if the same city hosted a raid all three years, each year it counts as one city)
 = **67** arrests/ rescues per day,
 and **3.48** arrests per city
 and **14.12** agents per arrest and rescue combined.
 Removing the arrested pimps from the equation, it took an average of **33.6** agents to find and rescue one child.

If there really are **100,000** children trafficked into the sex industry **every year**, at the rate these fine officers were able to rescue the grand total of **253** children in those **9 days over three years**, it would have taken **10,071,499** additional officers to locate and rescue the **299,747** children who were not located using the detective skills of the 8,500 agents. Unfortunately, there are only about 900,000 federal, state and local law enforcement officers currently employed, so even if all of them did no other criminal investigations except look for child victims over the same nine days in three years, there would not be sufficient resources to find them.

Over the course of 3 years and minus the 9 days in which 253 children were rescued, or 1,086 days, if 9,274 agents 'rescued' 276 children per day, they'd get caught up in their rescue attempts. Then, the next year, another 100,000 children would be 'kidnapped' and forced into the sex industry.
 On the other hand, some abolitionists claim that there are 300,000 children trafficked into prostitution every year... so we'd need **27,822** agents rescuing **828** victims per day...

With all these resources, why can't more child victims be found? In 2012, state by state ([TABLE #69](#)), there were a grand total of **657 minors arrested for prostitution**. Because by 'rescue' they actually mean "arrest." Even children under 10 are **ARRESTED**, put in handcuffs and traumatized by being tossed into a jail cell until they were either released to the custody of their parents (where they may have been the victim of incest) or sent to live in a foster home or other locked down facility. While in custody, many of them are victims of rape at the hands of the guards or other inmates.

"This seventh iteration of Operation Cross Country also was the most successful, with a 30% to 40% increase in "identifying both victims and pimps" compared with previous operations..."

OH, REALLY? In what way was it more successful if, in 2013, there were 54.8% more cities and 51.9% more agents than in 2011 looking for victims and yet there was a mere 37.4% increase in victims rescued/ arrested? It took 1800 additional agents in 36 additional cities to rescue 36 more 'victims'

It took a total of 8,500 agents in 173 cities over 9 days during those three years to rescue 253 victims... how is that a success by ANY standard if, out of an alleged 100,000 to 300,000 children

trafficked into the 'sex industry' each year, they manage to find .03% to 0.1% of the alleged victims?
