Sex offenses (except forcible rape and prostitution)	68,355	NOTE: Arrests for most of the listed non- violent 'crimes' do not have a complaining 'victim' who reported being victimized other than the arresting officer(s). The charge of "offenses against the family and children" is not listed as a violent crime, but it is possible that some of those cases did have a reporting victim. It is unknown what constitutes the 'sex offenses - except forcible rape' and we have been unable to find a definition for these offenses. Additionally, 'disorderly conduct' charges are often used instead of a 'solicitation' or 'prostitution' offense if the arresting officers do not have sufficient 'cause' to make their case against the individual. We do not know how many of these cases of disorderly conduct would have been arrests for prostitution. "Disorderly conduct" is a 'catch-all' charge used to cover a number of 'activities' when cops do not have sufficient probable cause to make an arrest for anything more serious. Unfortunately for persons charged with such a 'crime,' the consequences of being arrested and charged at all are serious and can lead to the loss of one's current job and all future potential employment, not to mention the expense of defending oneself against these nebulous 'charges.' The estimated number of arrests for these non violent crimes has been retained for purposes of comparison and general information.
