

But when prostitutes are actually *RAPED- by COPS...* very seldom are the cops punished- or fired- *or even arrested...* like these 26 Newark NJ police officers who were accused of raping, robbing and beating prostitutes.

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TAINTED FORCE: A special report.;Newark Police Troubles: Out of Control at the Top

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In the summer of 1993, 26 Newark police officers were accused of raping, robbing and beating prostitutes. Although the victims identified the officers through photo line-ups, city records show that the department never followed through on the allegations and has done nothing to discipline the officers.

Last March, four officers were arrested by Internal Affairs agents for stealing cars from city residents and selling them to friends. Nine months later, the accused officers, who have pleaded not guilty, are still on active duty, and the Internal Affairs commanders who uncovered the case have been transferred out of the unit.

And in late spring, Mayor Sharpe James received a city audit showing that tens of thousands of dollars were missing from an investigative account controlled by the Police Director, William R. Celester. The Mayor restricted Mr. Celester's access to the fund, but allowed him to continue leading the 1,300-member force until Federal agents raided Mr. Celester's home and office on Nov. 9.

Current and former Newark police officers say the lack of action on the prostitution and auto theft cases and the treatment of Mr. Celester are all symptoms of a troubled department that for several years has been allowed to run out of control -- of a place where corruption was long tolerated, where criminal behavior was often ignored and where would-be reformers were punished or harassed.

Or like the two LAPD officers James Nichols and Luis Valenzuela, who are still on the job despite charges of raping numerous prostitutes, including one who was a police informant- so far, the police chief is merely trying to find a way to fire them.... *“Valenzuela, a 16-year department veteran, and Nichols, who has been an officer for 13 years, are awaiting disciplinary hearings, where it will be decided whether to fire them. City prosecutors, meanwhile, are reviewing the case to decide whether to file criminal charges...”* (they’ve been reviewing these cases for over 3 years now... what does it take to ARREST THESE RAPISTS?)
