How many confirmed victims were found in the US in 2011? The numbers are not yet available from the US Government, but the number of confirmed victims of human trafficking from the previous year was approximately 301 [from January 2008 to June 2010, there were 2,515 investigations started, of which only 754 were confirmed over the 30 month period, or approx. 301 confirmed victims per year.]

So taxpayers funded these agencies at a cost of \$26,000,000 to find and rescue approximately 301 victims- there was not a significant increase in the number of victims in 2011 from various sources, but if we give the government the benefit of the doubt, perhaps we could say there were 500 or 700 victims in 2011... all these agencies vying for the same victims... because there are not enough victims to go around for everyone.

The majority of resources were spent looking for victims of sex trafficking, as the government considers all prostitutes to be victims and are much easier to look for than victims of human trafficking into the primary destination for victims world wide- into domestic servitude. When a prostitute is arrested, (primarily females) they are offered the opportunity to agree that they are victims and testify against their alleged traffickers...

if they do not agree to testify and do not admit to being a victim, they are prosecuted and sent to jail. The police can and do seize their assets under the asset forfeiture laws.

Meanwhile, in 2011, there were 243,800 REPORTED violent rapes and sexual assaults but only 14,943 (6.1%) arrests of alleged rapists. There were 1,353,340 REPORTED domestic violence cases, 368,820 of which were SERIOUS domestic violence cases [no stats on number of arrests of perpetrators]... there were also 57,345 arrests for prostitution, at a cost of approximately (\$3,967 per arrest based on the 1987 Hastings Law Journal estimate of cost per arrest of \$2,000 adjusted for inflation) \$227,487,615.
